As we gathered with our prayer team week after week, we petitioned to the Lord for a home for the PCC. We were specific with our requests and to God be the Glory, we are watching as our prayers are being answered. We can't wait to reveal the center in due time and

open the doors to our church families and clients. We ended last year with a victory! We had a fifteen-yearold young lady contact us looking to escape her family situation because she was being asked to have an abortion against her will by her mom. Ultimately, after working with our partners we were able to help her keep the baby and she had decided to go to the boyfriend's home whose family was willing to take her in.

Weeks later, we received an anonymous call from the mother of this young teenage girl. The mom was requesting information to help her daughter find a shelter, not realizing that we had already been in communication with her daughter. The Lord gave me the opportunity to speak to the mom. As I began ministering to her, she admitted to attending church regularly and even said her Pastor once told her that her fifteen-year-old daughter had a "calling" on her life. But the mom said, "is this it? An unexpected pregnancy?"

As we continued along the conversation, she gave me the opportunity to pray with her and I was so honored to be able to do so. After a long talk, I encouraged her to stand by her daughter and not abandon her. I reminded her how we all fall short of the glory of God but we must believe Gods word is the truth in every situation and to have faith, standing on his promises. I was happy to connect her with a Pastor to speak with and the resources she needed to be able to help her daughter and seek reconciliation. We praise God that the baby was not aborted. We look forward to the day when this mom and daughter reach out to us and tell us how the baby has blessed their lives. God is able!

Jeremy Stephens Pastor- Bethel Evangelical Free Church, Staten Island For most pastors, Easter weekend is our Superbowl weekend. It's full of highly planned and prayed for services. We're making sure our guest services volunteers are excited and on-mission. Our worship teams have had extra practices. There's that one video or skit that we hope will connect. We must explain once again what the word Maundy means, even if our church tradition doesn't have a Thursday evening service. We've sat through planning and preparation meetings for months, and we still must write multiple sermons. As you can imagine, there's a lot of enthusiasm and stress.

Yet, if you were to ask me about a single Easter weekend that stands out in my memory as a pastor, it would be Easter weekend of 2017. I can still picture it and feel the crisp air. It's early in the morning on Good Friday, and I'm walking in the front door of one of Boston's most prestigious hospitals to sit with a family I dearly love, who had just delivered and said goodbye to their precious son.

Several weeks before, they had heard the devastating news that their son was likely unable to develop any more in the womb, and that he would likely pass away shortly after birth. The family was advised to terminate the pregnancy. Yet, this couple trusted that the Lord in His infinite goodness and power could work a miracle. On that morning, the miracle wasn't quite what we prayed for. Yet, they were able to hold their son, take in his beauty, and grieve over his loss together.

As we cried together in that small hospital room overlooking a cold city emerging from winter, we read from 2 Corinthians 1:3-5:

Blessed be the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, the Father of mercies and God of all comfort, who comforts us in all our affliction, so that we may be able to comfort those who are in any affliction, with the comfort with which we ourselves are comforted by God. For as we share abundantly in Christ's sufferings, so through Christ we share abundantly in comfort too.

If you were to ask this couple about their son today, the first thing they'd point to is that they feel more connected to the death of our Savior and the devastation that must have come with it on that day, having shared in their own loss of a son on Good Friday. And, more so, they share a deep hope in an Easter for all who believe in Christ. That there is a resurrection and a hope. That there is a life eternal. That there is a Good Father who is acquainted with our grief.

A great privilege of being a pastor, and a great privilege you can have by volunteering with an organization like the PCC of NY, is that you can sit with those who are in times of fear and grief, and you can bring them to the seat of the God of Comfort. To the seat of the God who understands our pain, or sorrow, our anxiety, and our loss. In the brokenness of a world plagued by sin, we can point together toward a God who makes Easter Sundays possible.

News Alert from Albany Update

New Yorkers for Constitutional Freedoms <u>www.albanyupdate.com</u>

The <u>National Defense Authorization Act for Fiscal Year 2024 (NDAA)</u> (H. R. 2670) was the focus of a months-long political struggle over the military's divisive policies on abortion, homosexuality, transgenderism, and other matters. That struggle is over. On most issues, the liberal side has prevailed.

The Republican-led House of Representatives <u>passed</u> its version of the NDAA on July 14, 2023. The Housepassed version of the bill contained a variety of provisions that were designed to stop the leftward drift of the U.S. Armed Forces. However, the Democrat-led Senate <u>passed</u> a different version of the NDAA on July 27, 2023 that omitted many of these provisions. As a result, a <u>conference committee</u> was formed to allow the House and the Senate to negotiate the final bill.


The final version of NDAA <u>contains</u> some policies that conservative New Yorkers will appreciate. Among them are provisions imposing a freeze on the hiring of so-called "<u>diversity, equity and inclusion (DEI)</u>" staff in the Armed Forces and capping the pay of the military's existing DEI staffers. The NDAA also bans the display of LGBT pride flags at military bases. Other provisions within the NDAA are more controversial, including the temporary extension of a program (known as Section 702) that allows the government to spy on the communications of foreigners.

The biggest problem with the final NDAA is not the language that it includes, but the language that is <u>missing</u> from it. Important conservative provisions contained in the House version of the bill were left out of the final NDAA. One such provision would have <u>forbidden</u> the Armed Forces from providing insurance coverage for cross-sex hormones and so-called "gender reassignment surgeries" for military personnel, and another would have made it unlawful for military bases to host drag shows. Most importantly, a proposed ban on the Biden administration's policy of providing <u>paid leave and travel reimbursement</u> to servicemembers who visit other states to obtain abortions was removed from the final version of the bill. The omission of this language is deeply disturbing to pro-life Americans.

The NDAA passed the U.S. Senate, <u>87-13</u>, on December 13, 2023. The following day, the House passed the bill, <u>310-118</u>. There was bipartisan support and bipartisan opposition to the bill in both houses. New York's two U.S. senators, Sen. Chuck Schumer (D-NY) and Kirsten Gillibrand (D-NY), both voted in favor of the bill. Of New York's 25 members of the House of Representatives, seventeen—including all 10 of New York's House Republicans—<u>voted</u> for the NDAA; eight House Democrats voted against it. (To be clear, none of the New York members of the House who voted against the NDAA did so because they were concerned about taxpayer funding of abortion travel; each one is pro-abortion.) President Joe Biden is expected to sign the NDAA into law.

It is disappointing that pro-life members of Congress did not insist upon a ban on travel reimbursement for servicemembers who cross state lines to obtain abortions. The simple fact is this: Some House Republicans—including some New York Republicans—are pro-choice. Furthermore, there is a troubling perception in Washington that being pro-life is a political liability. Republicans who decline, for whatever reason, to take a clear stand for life are likely to disillusion and alienate many of the very voters who voted them into office.
